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## CHARACTER @ KHS

### “Walking a Mile in Someone Else’s Shoes”

On September 27, 2007 students from Keswick High School took part in a practice emergency evacuation, at the Cedarvale long term care home in Keswick. It was a *mock* fire drill where students had to pretend to be senior citizens and hang tough in whatever situation they were in. They had to wear tags around their necks stating their medical status as a senior citizen; whether they were in palliative care, unconscious, able to walk or paralyzed. Students put forth a tremendous effort to act the part of a senior. Seniors remained inside the building and were aware of what was happening but were thrilled by the fact that such young students were helping them out. Cedarvale did this *mock* evacuation because they did not want to take the risk of actually moving some of the seniors out of the home in case of injury.



***“I was acting as a senior who was completely paralyzed and couldn’t move. I felt really safe and the nurse came to my aid quickly. I felt that the role of an elderly person was a good experience and really made me understand and realize how much they have to depend on others.”*** – Kelsey Robichaud, Grade 11 Keswick High School student.

It turned out to be a spectacular benefit not only for Cedarvale, but also for the students. They were able to take the place and literally ***be*** a senior and find out what it is really like to not be able to just “Get Up and Go.”

***“It is always good to be prepared, that way you know what you have to work on in the future. Your students helped us to create a sense of realism in the evacuation.”***– Julie Casaert- Director of Resident and Family

our belief that many skills which homework helps to develop prove to be useful for secondary school, post secondary levels and for later employment-related situations, as well as to assist students in becoming lifelong learners. A more detailed explanation of Keswick High’s philosophy on homework can be found on page 24 of the Student Agenda Planner.

### ***“Why Do Teachers Assign Homework?” – The Purpose of Homework***

Homework is assigned for different purposes, and depending on the purpose, the form of homework and the feedback provided will be different. The two most common purposes for homework are:

- (1) **Practice:** assigned when the student is expected to review material covered in class. Practice homework helps to reinforce the skills taught in class and helps students to develop a deeper conceptual knowledge of the content.
- (2) **Preparation / Elaboration:** assigned to prepare students for new content or have them elaborate on content that has been introduced.

As parents, you can help your child understand the value of homework by explaining its purpose and sharing your philosophy on the important character traits it helps to develop.

Please be assured that all homework will be discussed in class and will be used by the teacher to improve learning.
